Can One Person Make a Difference? A Message from Pastor Mark

It's easy for us to think that one person can't make much of a difference in the world, even though we can name individuals who have had a significant impact on our world. Think of people like Martin Luther, Abraham Lincoln, Martin Luther King, Jr., and others. It may be difficult for us to see ourselves in the same way we see people such as these. And yet God calls us, as followers of Jesus Christ, to be his hands and his feet in our communities and our world, so the love of Christ will be known by those we are called to help.

Every year on Super Bowl Weekend, our church participates in the Souper Bowl of Caring. It's a time when our confirmation students challenge us to help the hungry locally and in the world. In their confirmation class, the students learn about hunger and ways we can help the hungry. They learn about how Lutheran World Relief is involved in digging wells in areas where there is famine. These wells not only provide water to drink, but water for irrigation so people can grow vegetables to eat. The students learn about Habitat for Humanity, which provides animals like goats, heifers, and chicks so people can have milk and eggs on a daily basis. And they learn that when these animals breed, the source of food expands.

Our confirmation students learn about local hunger programs like Daily Bread Food Pantry in Danbury, Loaves and Fishes in New Milford, and our church's Love Fund. They learn how Dorothy Day Hospitality House in Danbury not only provides beds for the homeless, but meals as well.

On Super Bowl Weekend, many of us will not only sit in front of our T.V.'s to watch the ultimate football game of 2018, but we will enjoy the game and commercials with the food and drink that goes with this tradition. Certainly we are thankful for the joys and blessings God has provided for us. I hope you will also see this weekend as an opportunity to help provide food and life-saving resources for those who hunger.

Can one person make a difference? Yes. But when many of us combine our resources to help those in need, a significant difference can be made in the lives of others. I hope you will participate in Souper Bowl of Caring by donating food and/or money on February 3 & 4. The food donated will go to Daily Bread Food Pantry. Our confirmation students will decide how best to distribute the money donated for the hungry. Look for our confirmation students to be holding pots after each of our worship services on February 3 & 4 to collect donations. Let's make a difference!

Overall weekly worship attendance for January went down 9%.

COUNCIL NEWS

Heather Pontonio, Chair of the Planning Committee, informed Council that the committee had considered the possibility of reducing the number of weekend worship services from three to two. Council had asked the committee to make a recommendation to Council about whether or not to reduce the number of worship services, paying special attention to the results of the Congregation Assessment Tool (the survey completed by the congregation) and the SWOT Analysis done by Council. (SWOT stands for strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats.) Heather informed Council that the Planning Committee recommended keeping the three worship services in place. A major reason for this centered on the congregation's goal to attract families with children. The Planning Committee felt that choices in service times provided important options for families with children. Council agreed with this and voted to keep the three worship services we have in place.



LENTEN SOUP SUPPERS AND EVENING PRAYER SERVICES

We will meet on the Wednesdays during Lent for a simple soup supper and evening prayer service. The first soup supper and service will be held on Wednesday, February 21st. Supper is from 6:30-7:30 p.m. and the service is from 7:30-8:15 p.m. If you are able to bring soup or bread for the supper, it would be much appreciated. There will be a sign up sheet on the table in the Narthex. Please consider being a part of this weekly community gathering for fellowship and prayer.

FLOWERS AT THE ALTAR

Most Sundays during the year, we have a beautiful bouquet of flowers at the altar that was created by the members of Altar Guild. Those flowers are dedicated and paid for by members of the congregation.

The arrangements cost \$25.00. If you would like to dedicate altar flowers in memory of a loved one, to the glory of God, or in honor of a person or event, you can sign up for your chosen date on the Flower Chart between the bathrooms in the Narthex. You also need to fill out a flower request form, which is located next to the Flower Chart, and put it in Rene Tuccillo's mailbox. Your name and dedication will appear in the worship bulletins. If two people sign up for the same date, flowers can be placed in other locations in the Sanctuary, such as on the organ or piano or at the baptismal font. We do not have flowers at the altar during lent.

February 4th – Healing at Simon's House (Mark 1:29-39)

In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus is constantly on the move. Everywhere we look, he is healing, blessing, gathering, and proclaiming God's love. His reputation continues to increase. Crowds follow him, the people are talking about him, and everyone is waiting to see what he'll do next. Simon's mother-in-law is restored to wholeness. Jesus displays his divine power as the Son of God. Healing is one of the very first things Jesus does in Mark's Gospel. We hear stories of Jesus healing those with physical and spiritual ailments. This is quite simply what Jesus does, and a large part of who he is. His authority is being established as he extends God's good gifts to include everyone, no matter what their situation. This kind of love, grace, and mercy was radical then, and it is radical now. Our children can never hear these stories too often.

February 11th – Elijah and Elisha (2 Kings 2:1-12)

The prophet Elijah was the prophetic voice for God's people through the reigns of Kings Ahab and Ahaziah—two of Israel's worst kings. Elijah has served as a mentor for Elisha, and now it is time for God to take Elijah away. Elijah's departure up to heaven by a whirlwind and fiery chariot is dramatic. Throughout the reign of four more pretty bad kings in Israel, Elisha will continue to bring God's messages to the people. This story shows an older, aging prophet mentoring and supporting his younger follower and successor. The story of Elijah and Elisha provides us with a model of what we can learn from others in our faith.

February 18th – God's Covenant with Noah (Genesis 9:8-17)

For forty days and nights, Noah and his family shared close quarters with animals, unsure if they would see creation restored. But then creation began again. The waters separated from the earth. Animals were brought forth. Humans received a blessing and were told to be fruitful and multiply. Noah went through the Creation story all over again. In this passage, we get the finalized Noahic blessing—a covenant between God and not only humans but every living creature. In this covenant, God promises to never again send a flood to destroy the earth. God makes promises, and these promises extend not just to us but to all of creation. Kids can learn from this that God is a promising God. Understanding God as a promising God should be a central way children understand God. God is also a promise-keeper. Kids can feel overlooked and ignored quite easily. The things of this world fail, people fail, and life seems like it will fall apart into chaos. But God does not fail. God is always faithful and always remembers us and the promises God makes to us.

February 25th – The Faith of Abraham (Romans 4:13-25)

Paul is taking a classic text in the Old Testament narrative (Genesis 15; 17) and reinterpreting it. He is writing to believers about Abraham's faith and God's promise to Abraham. Abraham is righteous because of his faith— not because he followed certain rules. This is true for us too. It is our faith in Jesus that makes us right with God. Abraham is a model of prelaw faith, because he trusted that God would do what God promised to do. Kids can relate this text to how often we trust in something before it even happens. For Abraham, being the father of a nation was preposterous. But he trusted God that much. Paul is using Abraham as an example to teach that we don't earn a right relationship with God—God understands us as righteous because we trust in God.

More Important News

Our Pre-School has been accredited by the NAEYC (National Association for the Education of Young Children) since 1999. In order to maintain our accreditation we must conduct a self-study every 5 years, which we have recently completed. The next step in this process is a visit by an assessor from NAEYC. Between January 22nd and February 9th, an assessor will be evaluating our program over two days. Four classrooms will be randomly selected and observed for one hour each. Our assessor will be looking at curriculum, relationships with the children and families, the environment, teachers' qualifications and the quality of the overall program. When you are finished, just put in a bag under the mailboxes with my name on it. Baby blankets go to Global Health Ministries and we will be blessing them on Mother's Day before we mail them off. KNITTED BABY BLANKET WITH HANDKERCHIEF EDGE

Materials: To make a blanket, (approximate size 33" square) use 2 skeins of baby yarn (decreasing with the 2^{nd} skein). If you use a "Baby Love Pound yarn"...just measure off approx. 33" before you start decreasing). If skeins are small, you may need to use 3 skeins (decreasing after 1 1/2 skein is used.)

Needles: 8 or 9 (circular is best)

Cast on 2 stitches Row 1: K1, YO, K1 Row 2: K2, YO, K1 Row 3: K2, YO, K to end of row. Repeat row 3 until 1 skein of yarn are used.

Decrease using 2nd skein of yarn K1, K2Tog, YO, K2Tog, K to end of row

Continue this procedure until 4 stitches remain. Bind off 4 stitches.
